The College's Community

Nottingham College delivers responsive, dynamic and comprehensive education and skills to meet local priorities. This includes:

- provision for young people at the start of their learning journey, with aspirational 14-16 programmes for pupils run in partnership with City and County secondary schools.
- Post-16 study programmes offering both academic and technical pathways to positive destinations. They pave the way for students to enter the world of work and apprenticeships, to access higher education and to launch their own business enterprises.
- Full-cost training to support individuals as they progress their careers and to help organisations with workforce development.
- Adults in the community benefit from the College's literacy, numeracy and ESOL provision plus learning for leisure provision.
- Apprenticeship provision supporting learners in work and aiding employers to enhance their workforce development strategies

All the College's curriculum sectors have described pathways to further or higher study, leading to progression and positive destinations which remain high at 92% overall, benefitting individual students, society and business.

Nottingham College students contribute to society as positive citizens. Through renowned employer engagement programmes, the College equips students with professional skills, knowledge, attitudes and behaviours along with confidence in career planning. Maths, English, digital literacy, citizenship, enterprise and resilience are embedded in all study programmes to ensure students are fully prepared for future success in work and life.

The College's campuses are accessible to local communities, with some facilities run by students. The College's staffing model is one of diverse expertise and supports the varied needs of the wide range of stakeholders the College serves.

The College's Value to Business

Every year students leave the College appropriately skilled and qualified to enter the workforce. As many of the College's students also choose to stay within the locality, business benefit from the skills they have gained to support a wide range of employment sectors in the local area.

The College's apprenticeship programmes support businesses to develop their own talent pool as well as ensuring continuation of skills needs and developments. The close relationships that the College maintains with local employers through vocational learning and apprenticeship programmes provide employers with a workforce specifically developed for their business needs.

The College's study programme students participate in work experience and work placements with local businesses.
